We were recently approached by the British Dyslexia Association, who asked if the school would take part in a series of information films about strategies for teaching dyslexic students. A film crew visited the school and recorded a number of lessons, as well as interviewing staff.

The six videos that they produced are now available, and, will shortly be on the school's website. Each one focuses on a different aspect of teaching and learning - Using Questions to Check Learning, Using Multi-Sensory Learning, Appropriate Use of IT, Outlining the Lesson at the Start, Making Links to Previous Learning, and Dyslexia-Friendly Handouts and Resources. Together they provide an excellent summary of what we do at Frewen that makes us so different from other schools.

We hope the films will be seen by parents of dyslexic children, and relevant specialists, providing them with useful information about how to work with dyslexic learners, as well as by informing the wider world about what we do. I would like to thank everyone who was involved in organising and appearing in the films!

On another note, the Year 11 Mock Exams are an important feature of the school year. As in any school, exams are taken extremely seriously at Frewen, by staff and students - and parents - alike. In most schools, students all sit their exams in a large hall, or sports hall, with a small number of invigilators, and everyone starting and finishing at the same time.

At Frewen, we like to do things differently, and, in order to give students the best chance of success, we apply for access arrangements for each student in order that they can really show what they can do. Depending on their needs, this can involve extra time (typically 25%), readers (who read the question papers to the students), scribes (who write the students' answers for them), and the use of IT, if this is the way a student usually works.

As a consequence it also involves exams being sat in many rooms, with a proportionate number of invigilators, readers and scribes. These consist of teachers and other Frewen staff, plus volunteers. We are very grateful to those of you who were good enough to help out in recent weeks. Without your help, it would not be possible to provide the level of support required to help the students at this important time.

Special thanks must go to Claire Brimmicombe-Wood, our Exams Officer, who organises and manages the exams in such a calm and responsible way.

Claire tells me that we still need additional support for the summer exams. If you think you might be able to help us out, please contact Claire via the school office, or via claire.wood@frewencollege.co.uk, and she will be happy to discuss the matter further. Training will be provided, and you will playing your part in helping our students to succeed!

"It's never too early to talk about numbers and quantities. One of the first words young children learn is 'more,"



Move three sticks to make the fish swim in the opposite direction.




Well done to all the Y11 & Y10 with their January Maths Mock Exams. Now the results are in, remember to ask for help when you are unsure/do not understand
