When we think about
achievement, the first thing that comes to
mind are GCSEs, and perhaps BTECs, A
Levels and other
exams which students typically take in Years
10, 11 and Sixth Form.

But there are other external exams which

can act as useful milestones along the way. One of these is the LAMDA Public Speaking examination. Public speaking, and being able to express ideas, or persuade others, is an extremely valuable life skill.

The LAMDA exam involves students preparing and presenting a speech, on a theme of their own choice, to an examiner. They have never met the examiner before, and everything takes place under exam conditions – so for a Year 7, for example, this is (a) quite a challenge, and (b) an excellent preparation for more major exams later on.

This year, almost half the students in the school – including every student in Years 7, 8 and 9 – took Public Speaking exams in February. Once again, we are celebrating record results!

Not only did we continue our 100% pass rate, but we went even further. Every student achieved the highest Merit and Distinction grades.

The younger students were joined by selected students in Years 10 and 11, and a number of Sixth Formers. Some of these older students took Grade 6. This is equivalent to A levels and gives students UCAS points for university admissions. This is because the examinations are accredited by the government's regulator, Ofqual.



This success is all the more remarkable when you remember that, when students join us, their selfconfidence is often at an all-time low. Once they arrive at Frewen, and start to receive our exceptional care, and to make progress as a result of our specialist teaching methods, they gradually – or in some cases, surprisingly quickly regain their self-esteem. These results demonstrate our students' outstanding progress.

I am not aware of any other school anywhere in the country where such a high proportion of students gain public speaking qualifications. With our students' hard work and teachers' expert guidance, Frewen College is a Centre of Excellence for public speaking.

I would like to congratulate all of the students involved on their success, and thank their teachers – in particular the English Department – for making it possible.

The Year 7s have now completed their entry for this years 'Draw Me In' exhibition at the Towner Gallery, Eastbourne. The project began with a workshop lead by visiting artist Annis Joslin, and the weeks that followed allowed students to generate their ideas for a final outcome involving letters and words. Over three months, the students have produced a stunning piece made from a variety of materials and techniques including willow (for the structures), ink, spray paint, photoshop and even the photocopier was used as a manipulating tool! As a year group students thoughts were compressed into this explanation about the work...

'We were immediately drawn to the beauty of word and letter forms we could see in 'Untitled'. Although we couldn't make out what the words said we were intrigued by the flowing lines that looked like patterns. Being dyslexic we must regularly consider how to form letters when writing, and through discussion we realised that perhaps it doesn't matter if words aren't spelt correctly or if they are illegible, they are still valid lines and marks. We wanted to show how difficult we find spelling and writing and wanted to demonstrate our struggle which we have daily. By making mountains with confused lettering and forms, there is darkness and confusion but as we climb (surmount) the mountain with (hardwork, time and understanding) the word becomes clearer and easier to spell. Despite the confusion, comes beauty and a feeling of achievement as we arrive at the top.'

The work can be seen as part of the 'Draw Me In' exhibition at the Towner Gallery, Eastbourne, from Friday 5th April - Sunday 2nd June.





'Was it handmade?' another asked about the Sedan chair.


Another student was fascinated about where the tunnels went: 'Do they really reach the church?'

Assemblies by Hazel Lawrence


Assemblies are an important part of school life, an opportunity to share information as well as an opportunity to stop and reflect. This term, students have enjoyed assemblies on:
