The Japanese word used to refer to comics or cartoons, manga originally translates as "pictures run riot".


It has been popular in its homeland for nearly 200 years but enjoyed global success in recent decades.


From its beginning with 19th century Japanese artist Hokusai - best known for his work The Great Wave - the exhibition spanned manga's varied history and looked at the different techniques of design and narrative that drive its works. Students had a wonderful day exploring the varied work and understanding the context from which manga was created as well as recognising its influence over anime and video games - not least the Pokemon phenomenon.

In response to the exhibition students were split into groups and tasked with designing a beginning, middle and end to their own manga story. Over the remainder of Activities Week the groups took it in turns to develop the story with Mr Stanley and then create the art work with Mr Sangster. The resulting story tells the tale of Koto a robot from the future, that tries to save humanity whilst defeating the evil Dr.Dislexxikk! The full finished comic can be seen through the corridors of the school, as well as two copies in reception. We hope you have as much fun reading it as we did making it!


