Hastings to Tokyo Challenge

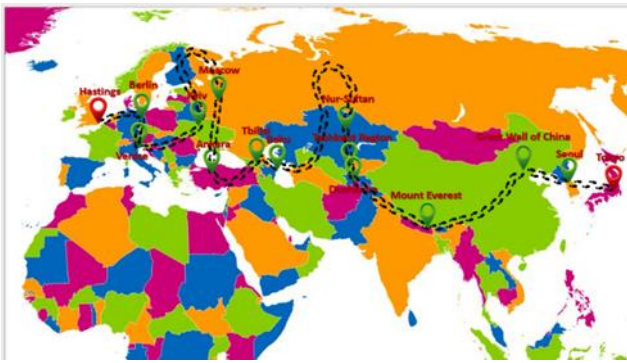
