We were blessed yesterday with a fantastic day out to the Hertmonceux Science Centre.

This trip supported our work on 'Space' for Blue and Green classes and 'Forces' for Red class.

Due to Covid restrictions, we were the only school there which gave the children greater freedom to explore the site. The day began with pupils exploring the indoor Science activities based around 'Forces', 'Light' and 'Our Solar System'. Everything in this area was very hands on, and children were fully engaged trying out all the different tasks in this area.

Pupils then went outside and explored the science-themed play areas which again were based around Forces. We then moved onto an area dedicated to the exploration of the science behind how the flow of water can be controlled.

Pupils then visited one of the observatories and listened intently to our expert who explained all about the moving floor and how we can view Space using the amazing telescopes.

After lunch, pupils completed a workshop on 'Robotics in Space' and had the opportunity to work in pairs to control the robotic arms and move objects using the control panel.

Finally, we just about beat the rain with one last play outside before visiting the shop where pupils chose from a variety souvenirs before returning home, happy but exhausted.

This year, the exams were put on hold and we halfexpected them not to take place. However, with the relaxing of restrictions and the slow move back towards normality, they are now rescheduled for June.


All our students, from Year 7 upwards are working extremely hard to prepare for their examinations. They have written speeches, chosen conversation topics, created posters and found interesting visual aids.

Failte. Here is a quick update on what has been going on in the Science labs during the last term.

We are looking at plant structures and functions with the year 9 cohort. This year it will be a special extended topic. We will be covering the basics of plant photosynthesis and the movement of water



and sugar around the plant as normal , and we will be undertaking additional activities to enhance the topic. Some of the activities will include a large 3D display in the auditorium, setting up a recycled vertical garden and engaging with the 'Green Frewen' after –school club' to investigate sustainable uses of



the grounds. Pictured below is a photo of plant stomata on a leaf, and our bijou bottles of algae and indicator to show how light intensity affects the rate of photosynthesis.

We have been working hard with the year 11 students to gather as much information as we can to show an accurate reflection of the working level of each individual in Science.

A Pertinent Probe into the Present Times


During this unsettling period of Covid-19 and a global pandemic, Health and Social Care as a curriculum subject has taken on a whole new significance which, I am proud to say, our Frewen students have embraced.

The Year 11 cohort are currently working towards their final exam; they are studying the various factors that affect our health and well-being. They have explored such issues as poverty, diet, obesity, substance abuse, environment, pollution and, perhaps most importantly, an individual's willingness to help themselves.

The Year 10 group have all been examining the different stages of life and how an unexpected life event such as a bereavement can affect an individual (physically, intellectually, emotionally or socially). They then explored the various forms of support that can help someone through such challenging times. The parallel between the course and the events currently affecting the World are clear to see.

Humanities & Geography by Louise Payne

Year 7 Humanities: This term the students have been learning all about tourism and we have been studying specific themes, including extreme tourism to Antarctica, eco-tourism, and local tourism. They have undertaken making their own tourism models out of recycled materials and engaged in virtual tours of regions of the world and are currently working on their own design for eco-tourism hotels.

Year 8 Geography: This term the students have been engaging with the topic of Glaciers and cold environments. Students have learned how glaciers move, how people can live and adapt to cold environments including places in the Arctic region, such as Svalbard, in Norway. They have produced some excellent work, including presentations and factfiles about the Athabasca Glacier and most recently, posters about glacier melt and global warming.

Year 11 Geography: Year 11 students have continued to work on the final aspect of their GCSE Geography course, engaging in the topics for Paper 3, as well as extensive revision. The students have been working hard at revising all of their Geography course for their assessments, being carried out this term.

The Year 7s learning about Islam has, this year, coincided with the Holy festivals of Ramadan and Eid. They have explored the importance of the pilgrimage to Mecca and the Five Pillars of Islam. We have also examined how Muslims fast during Ramadan, but we are not all convinced that we would be able to do it ourselves!

Serious Stuff

Year 9 RE students have been introduced to some very big issues this term. With a great deal of maturity, they have been examining a range of controversial subjects such as abortion, the death penalty and capital punishment. Not only has this furthered their understanding of different religious perspectives, but has also allowed them the opportunity to see how a topic can be looked at from different angles.

We have cleared our site, laid down cardboard to deter the weeds and started to create a cottage garden style design of walkways and beds. Students had been studying the work of Ray and Charles Eames during Lockdown and had looked at methods for forming plywood. They made their first models for Salad servers

from cardboard whilst at home, these were developed into accurate templates on their return and after weeks of practical we are very pleased to share the results.

A big hats off and a massive thank you to our fantastic Year 11 Drama students for the sheer effort that they have put into their final devised Drama project this term.



Bushcraft

During our Games sessions for KS3 we have been trying to introduce more Outdoor Education options and this term have been lucky enough to have Ms Chambers helping and leading some Bushcraft sessions. Outdoor Education can help students develop skills such as independence, resilience, managing risk and problem-solving skills. We are hoping to continue this next year during these sessions and offer a range of Outdoor Education sessions alongside more traditional sport.

Ms Chamber's Bushcraft tales

Students in Year 7, 8 and 9 have been enjoying learning some Bushcraft skills during their PE lessons, and after school in Bushcraft Club, on a Tuesday. They have been learning about knife law, safe handling and cutting techniques. Students have been showing their skills by creating feather sticks. The club students have also been learning about gathering appropriate wood for fire lighting, and about different fire lays for different purposes.

Last week students explored the grounds on a foraging walk, where they found some plants that are deliciously edible including young Beech leaves and Wood Sorrel (in moderation!) whilst also identifying the UKs most poisonous plant (Hemlock Water-Dropwort) growing at the edge of the stream running through the woods!



The foraging culminated in cooking some Bannock Bread in the woods, including some of the students' foraged ingredients.
