Dear Parents

Here we are at the end of another exciting term at Frewen!



In some ways, it has felt as if we have been getting back to normal after the disruption of the pandemic. We held our first public event - it was lovely to see parents, students and villagers at the excellent firework display, courtesy of Northiam Bonfire Society, in November. School trips and visits have resumed, such as the KS4 trip to The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night in London. We have been able to go through most of the term without wearing face coverings (except in confined spaces), and Mr Stanley and I were able to attend the ISA Awards Ceremony in Coventry and pick up the award for Outstanding Learning Provision 2021! (We were also finalists in the Senior School of the Year awards, just in case you hadn't heard!)

Ofsted have resumed their inspection regime, and we were visited in late November for the (usually) annual Social Care inspection of Boarding. Three inspectors spent three days going through all aspects of boarding, including safeguarding, health and safety, as well as looking at how we support our boarders. Their report will be published during the Christmas holidays - but it seemed to go well. Thanks to Mrs Medcraft and her team, and everyone else - including the students - who contributed!

But in other ways, things are still not back to normal. Year 11 are doing their mock exams - but this is the first in a series of sets of mocks designed to take the place of real exams if there should be another lockdown. Open mornings, parents evenings and some internal meetings are still online, and at the time of writing we have had a small number of students testing positive and having to go home. We continue to follow the DfE guidelines - and as of 29th November students are wearing masks in communal areas again. The new omicron variant makes it even more important that you remind your child to test twice-weekly, including during the Christmas Holidays.

Sadly, there will be no carol service or fish and chips on the last day of term - we have had to adapt our celebrations because of the pandemic. However, there will be a Christmas Concert for students, a Christmas Quiz, a decorating the doors competition - and our reward to the students for winning a national award: a trip on the steam train from Northiam to Tenterden and back!

I would like to wish you and your families a happy and safe students, and we look forward to seeing all students, including a few new ones, back for the first day of next term: Wednesday, January 5th.

It has been fantastic to see them developing self confidence s well as developing new skills.


Your child can sign up during games/ afterschool there is charge for this but please let Mr Swinson know if you would like to have a go.
