Many of you will know Grégoire from the help that he has provided in supporting your child through a particularly difficult time, or in helping you to negotiating the dreaded EHC funding route, and helping your child to access the support that they so clearly need.

I know you will join me in wishing Grégoire all the very best in his new role as Vice Principal (Strategic) of Goldwyn School in Kent.

We are currently recruiting for a new, long-term Vice Principal for September, and will be holding interviews an April.

For the Summer Term, Hazel Lawrence (Head of Sixth Form) will take on the role of Designated Safeguarding Lead, and oversee exams; and we will be joined after the May Bank Holiday by an Interim Vice Principal, Elizabeth Mason, who will take on Gregoire's other roles including Teaching and Learning and SEND provision. Elizabeth has a broad range of experience in both mainstream and SEND education, and we are looking forward to working with her.


<u>Curriculum</u>



Science

We are making good progress in Science this term.

Mr Wassell The year 8 groups have recently been looking in combustion reactions. This gives us the opportunity to set a mixture of corn starch and sugar on fire. This does require a few hours of work to remove the powder from our Bunsen burners. But it is a popular practical with the students, who compete to get the highest flame.

A mention now for the Y10 entry level group who are often overlooked in the newsletter. They have been flexing their creative juices recently. They came up with the idea of using stop motion to show how part of our immune system works. We have used the director's cut which includes footage of the bandaged hand of Max.













Recently the Art department have had the pleasure of working with Lynn Katz, who is currently working in Boarding, sharing her expertise as a ceramics teacher, and practising artist.

She has been working with some year 8 classes helping them to develop their portrait projects and create clay 2D relief outcomes. The students enjoyed the experience of working with a practising artist, as well as learning various techniques when working with clay.

Once finished we hope to use a raku firing technique to fire the work, which should result in some unpredictable and exciting outcomes.



Music

Mrs Hurford-Jones In Music this term at Frewen the KS3 students have been focussing on how to play ensemble pieces, trying a variety of different instruments, and also learning about different structures in Music.

Y7 have been using BandLab to create a piece of Rondo Music, having already explored 12 Bar Blues and Theme and Variations. The Y10 BTEC Musicians have been practicing hard for a performance at the end of this term, trying a selection of songs, working on balance and timing and also trying a bit of improvising.

Mr Barnett continues to coach the extra-curricular bands in Y9 and 10 who will also be performing soon.

The Y11 BTEC students have had a very successful set of results from their Unit 1 exam, with all achieving a Level 2 at either pass or merit grade. They are now working towards their last performance this term which will be the culmination of all their hard work and practice



Humanities and RE

Year 7 Humanities:

This term, Year 7 have been learning about Medieval society and have particularly focused on how Medieval people lived, the murder and death of Thomas Becket and the Black Death.

As part of their learning about Thomas Becket, Year 7 have recently enjoyed a visit to Canterbury Cathedral, where they undertook a costume trail around the Cathedral and engaged in activities in their school room. Year 7 have also produced some great pieces of work this term, including their own medieval pictures of heaven and hell. A great term Year 7- well done!

Year 8 Geography:

Year 8 have been engaging in the topic of Coasts and have worked on specific topics, to include the topics of coastal erosion and erosional landforms, such as the Old Harry rock stack.

They have also enjoyed using playdoh and lots of labelled diagrams to recreate some of these landforms, such as wavecut platforms. In addition,

They have worked on deposition and depositional landforms, such as bars and spits, to include Spurn Head spit and have been able to explain the process of longshore drift. Well done Year 8, on all your hard work!



Year 9 RE:

Year 9 have continued working on the topic of suffering and pain and how different religions manage this. We have had some good discussions during the lessons about personal and religious beliefs and Year 9 have been able to formulate their own views, in a developed way.

Some of the topics covered have included healing and miracles in the religions of Islam and Christianity and the specific pilgrimages to Lourdes and pilgrimage of the Hajj.

Other topics addressed have included the reasons for suffering, to include free-will and karma and Jesus's sufferings on the cross. Year 9 have produced some great work, to include questions about clips and stories showing how mothers and fathers reflect God's love. Excellent work, Year 9!

Bushcraft


